



What dilemma? Let me explain.

As recently as about five years ago, the art and science of hair restoration was in reasonably good shape. The minicrisis precipitated by the numerical dropoff of patients had stabilized and denigratory advertising seemed to be on the decline. A sense of collegial civility was beginning to prevail in a young Society beginning to find its feet.

The specialty itself was moderately multidimensional with several treatment options available to practitioners. Scalp reduction was declining in popularity but there was always the

The benefits of FUHT, once recognized, were embraced to the virtual exclusion of all other modalities of hair restoration. The change, although profound, was insidious and not the subject of much discussion in hair restoration circles despite its potential for changing the way hair restoration is delivered.

So What's the Problem?

Hair restoration, as it exists today, is virtually a one-dimensional, one hammer, and one nail treatment. The universal acceptance of FUHT has had a stultifying effect on hair restoration by crowding out all other modalities of treatment. The result is that a lay individual can deliver

possibility that Patrick Frechet might yet restore it to at least a semblance of its former glory.

At this juncture, a great new treatment modality, follicular unit hair transplantation (FUHT), came on the scene. Ironically, it was this that triggered the present dilemma.

the present treatment modality with only a few months training. This may have undesirable consequences for patient and practitioner alike in that the ease with which hair restoration can be effected will not go unnoticed by those motivated only by the desire to make a quick buck with the minimum of effort.

This is not a criticism of FUHT. It is an undesirable side effect of its success. Please don't kill the messenger.



Votes from the Editor Emeritus

A hearty welcome to new Forum editors Drs. Bill Parsley and Mike Beehner. They are being eased into this important post over the next couple of editions by

retiring editors Drs. Dow Stough and Russell Knudsen.

For newcomers to the ISHRS, a little history may be applicable at this point in time, and I quote from a paper that I presented in Korea in May this year.

Hair Transplant Forum International was the brainchild of Dr. O'Tar T. Norwood from Oklahoma City and the first edition of 4 pages was published privately by O'Tar in September 1989. It was definitely an example of an idea whose time had come, as it took off immediately and subsequent editions expanded rapidly to 8 and then 12 pages as subscribers and contributors quickly realized the value of an international newsletter in which to exchange ideas.

It was only a matter of time before the need for an International Society was recognized. All the past meetings in this field had been conducted by American Societies of Dermatology, Dermatologic Surgery or Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery and non-board certified practitioners were not able to gain full membership. Hair transplant surgeons were from a wide variety of medical disciplines and many were family physicians with a flair for surgery. O'Tar and Dow Stough were the driving force behind this move to create a new society, and the ISHRS was founded at a meeting held in Dallas, Texas in May 1993.

In 1995, O'Tar retired from the constant pressure of the Forum and sold the newsletter to the ISHRS for \$50,000... He very generously gifted this money back to the ISHRS for use in a fund to encourage improvement in hair transplant techniques. Dr. Richard Shiell, from Melbourne, Australia, who had been the most prolific contributor to the Forum over the previous 5 years, was appointed as the new Editor. Under his guidance, the Forum expanded to a standardized 32 pages (occasionally 36), and many regular features such as "Life Outside" of Medicine," "Surgeon of the Month," and "Dermatology for the Non-Dermatologist" were added.

After three exhausting years, Richard handed over the reins to two ex-Presidents of our organization, Dow Stough and Russell Knudsen. These energetic, politically aware, and computer literate young men quickly dragged Forum production techniques into the computer age and the fax machine, metal scissors, and bottles of paste were pensioned off to be replaced by their electronic equivalents.

A great deal of responsibility rests with the *Forum* editors as the ISHRS Board gives them complete editorial freedom. While traditional peer review of material is not the usual practice, the Editors have all had vast experience in hair restoration surgery, so there is a type of peer review before publication. In addition, readers may be assured that all past editors have sought assistance from other experts in the field before publishing sensitive or potentially controversial material (and sometimes from many such individuals).

Bill and Mike, we wish you every success in this new role. It will be a lot of work and you will not get to watch much TV over the next three years. It will be a rewarding experience, however, and certainly one you will always treasure when you, too, have joined the growing ranks of Forum Editors Emeriti.

The Puerto Vallarta Meeting

This went off on schedule October 18-22, and meeting convenor Dr. Marc Avram is to be commended for his excellent program and smooth organization under trying circumstances. While the meeting halls always appeared to be comfortably filled, the obvious gaps in the speaker schedule were the main indicators of last minute cancellations as a result of the events of September 11.

The workshops and social events were well attended. The Saturday night dinner took the form of a fiesta with a variety of Mexican music and colorful dance from various regions demonstrated. At this event, the ISHRS Awards were presented and we were all delighted to hear that Dr. David Seager had received the Golden Follicle Award and Dr. Bob Bernstein the Platinum Follicle Award for 2001. Both were thoroughly deserved after many years of dedicated research, lecturing, and writing in our field.

The ISHRS Scientific Committee awarded only one research bursary this year, and that went to Professor J.C. Kim and his research team at the Kyungpook National University Hospital in Taegu, Korea. Dr. Jung Chul Kim was our first Platinum Award winner in 1994, and I am sure we will hear much more from him in the future as he and his team have many research projects in hand.

Discussions between ISHRS and ABHRS
